Acting as temporary Chairman until the arrival of Prof. Taylor, Prof. lerson called the meeting to order, appointing Prof. Thomson temporary Sec'y.

Following a discussion of the purose of the conference, it was moved by Dr. Hazzard and duly seconded, that the Chairman appoint a Committee of three to draw up and submit a Constitution and By-Laws at the next session. The motion hating prevailed, the Chairman appointed

Prof. Taylor now arrived and assumed the chairmanship of the meeting.
On motion of Prof. Todd, it was agreed that the dinner, as scheduled in
the circular-invitation, be held in the Tea Room of the Imperial Hotel at
6 o'clock that same evening, and that Prof. Taylor's address be postponed,
with his consent, until 11 o'clock the following day, in order that an opportunity might be afforded those who cared to do so to attend the graduating
exercises of the Academy, to be held at 8 p.m.

On motion, Dr. Hazzard was requested to act as a Committee of one to make arrangements for the dinner.

The meeting was then adjourned till after the dinner.

Imperial Hotel Tea Room, Portland, Oregon, 7.00 p.m., June 16, 1911.

Those participating in the dinner were Professors Taylor, Anderson, Todd, Sherwood, Thomson, Dunn, and Doctors Sidey, McKinlay, Hazzard.

After the dinner a short business session was convened, at which time Prof. Todd, Secretary of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, presented the following report:-

We recommend for your adoption the following Constitution;Article 1.-Name and Object.

Section 1.-This Association shall be known as the Classical Association be Pacific Northwest.

Section 2.-Its aim shall be to further by contact, mutual criticism, and discussion, the effectiveness and spirit of classical teachers, and to promote the general state of Classical studies.

Article II .- Members .

Section 1.-Any person who resides within the territory covered by the Association and is interested in the study and teaching of the Classics, whether actually engaged in teching or not, shall be eligible to membership.

Section 2.-The Executive Committee shall have power to elect suitable persons to membership. Members in good standing may at any time submit names in writing to the Secretary-Treasurer for action by the Executive Committee. Any person seeking membership may make application in writing to the Secretary-Treasurer.

## Article III.-Officers.

Section 1.-The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary-Treasurer. These officers shall be elected on the second day of the annual meeting.

Section 2.-There shall be an Executive Committee, to consist of the officers named in Section 1 of this Article and of four other persons to be elected at the same time as the officers are elected.

Article 1V.-Powers and Duties of Officers.

Section 1.-The duties of the officers shall be those that commonly devolve MNon such officers.

Section 2.-The Executive Committee shall have power to elect members, as provided in Article II.It shall have power to make arrangements for the annual meetings. The Committee shall have such further powers as are bestowed upon it elsewhere in this Constitution or may be conferred upon it by vote of the Association. In the interim between meetings it shall act for the Association, with full power. It shall make a written report of its acts at each annual meeting.

## Article V.-Dues.

Sectionl .- Every member shall pay into the treasury of the Association annually a fee of two dollars, payable at the annual meeting.

Section 2 .- Any member may become a life member on payment into the X treasury of the Association of the sum of twenty (20) dollars.

Section 3 .- Failure to pay the annual fee for two consecutive years shall ipso facto termiate membership in the Association.

Section 1 .- The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as the Association may by vote determine, or, if the Association fails to take action, as the Executive Committee may determine.

Section 2 .- Special meetings may be held at such times and places as the Association itself or the Executive Committee may determine.

Article VII .- Programme of Meetings . Publications .

Section 1.- The Executive Committee shall have power to arrange for a programme of papers and discussions at the annual meetings. Its decision in regard to the availability of papers offered for presentation before the Association shall be final.

Section 2 .- Publications of the Association, of whatsoever kind, shall be issued only under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

## Article VIII .- Amendments.

Section 1.-This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of all the members present at any session of a regular meeting subsequent to that in which at least the substance of the proposed amendment has been laid before the Association.

The members attending the dinner at the Imperial Hotel, after adopting a Constitution, on motion adjourned to attend the graduating exercises of the Portland Academy, agreeing to re-assemble at9.30 a.m.

Professor Taylor having now assumed the chair, the Conference resumed the discussion of organiztion and such business as was therein entailed.
