Herman A. Clark of the University of Oregon was inserted between numbers 10 and 11 on the scheduled program. An average of 35 was present. The day was completed by an informal reception at the Faculty men's Club at which the President's Address was given. Refreshments were served.

On Saturday morning at 9:30 the meeting was called together <sup>Friday</sup> with Professor Sereno Burton Clark, the vice-president, in the chair. 30 present. Numbers 13 + 14 of the program were given.

During the Round Table discussion of the Objectives of Latin Teaching Professor Terry of the School of Education from the Philippines said it was a grand thing to be over here with American people and to be thoroughly contaminated with American principles; that these studies would put Latin on an entirely different basis in secondary schools; and that in his own high school his Latin teachers did him more good than any others.

Miss Helen C. Taggart spoke of the English teacher's experiment at Lincoln High School, Seattle. The principles of Latin were taught for five or six weeks and then ten weeks given to English grammar. Miss Harriet Storman said she saw a marked improvement in technical knowledge of English grammar in Seattle schools. Miss Eugene Platt told of test exams given for those taking up foreign languages in Everett Wash. high school. Such appalling failures called for reorganization of English grammar in grades. Gonzaga University insists on one year of Latin from all students according to Rev. James E. Malone.

The minutes and Treasurer's Report were read and accepted.

Committee on Nominations recommended that present officers be continued for another year. Secretary instructed to cast unanimous ballot. Moved that next meeting be in Portland at Christmas time 1923. Professor F. S. Hurm recommended to recommend our section on the committee to prepare a program for the N. E. A. in Berkeley in 1920.
