### Rev. Whittlesey, Philomath College Educator, Passes

Philomath, April 4.—Rev. Charles T. Whittlesey, professor of ancient languages in Philomath college, died Sunday at Corvallis general hospital, after a lingering illness of heart disease and complications.

He was born in Rocksbury, Conn., September 21, 1858, and was graduated from Amherst college in the class of 1883. Last summer he attended the centennial anniversary of the college and the reunion of his class. He was also graduated from the divinity division of Yale. For many years Prof. Whittlesey was engaged in ministry on the coast, serving pastorates for the Presbyterian and Congregational churches at Eugene, Pendleton and Newport. He married Miss Penelope Skinner in 1890. He taught ancient languages at Dallas college when that was a flourishing institution, and for eight years had held a similar chair in Philomath college.

Prof. Whittlesey's mother lives in Connecticut and a brother is a Methodist minister in Kansas. His wife, a daughter, Mrs. Ludella Goodspeed of Seattle, and three sons, Ralph E. Whittlesey of Los Angeles, Roland D. Whittlesey of Portland and Raymond C. Whittlesey of the university of Beirut, Syria, survive.

The funeral will be held Wednesday in the college chapel at Philomath. Burial will be in Greenwood cemetery, Portland.

The fourteenth annual meeting of the northern section of the Classical Association of the Pacific States was held on the campus of the University of Washington January 2-3, 1924. Professor S. B. Clark called the first session to order in Denny Hall and introduced President Henry Suzzallo, who gave a welcome to the members of the Association in his usual sympathetic and stimulating manner. The program for the morning followed the printed announcement, excepting for the postponement of No. 3 until Saturday. Professor Woodbridge could not be present, and his paper was read by Miss Emilie Fuller of Seattle.
