The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the Northern Section of the Classical Association of the Pacific States in joint session with the Classical Association of the Pacific States was held in Room 6, Johnson Hall, University of Washington, December 27, 1935.

The meeting was called to order at 9:45 with Dr. Thomas K. Sicker, president of the Classical Association of the Pacific States, presiding. He called attention to the material on display, sent by the Classical Bureau and read the winning poems of the Horace contest, after which the program as printed and inserted followed.

Lunch was held at 12:30 at the Edmund Meany Hotel.

Portland, Oregon December 29, 1936.

After a luncheon, sponsored by the Portland Classical Club, at Henry's, 2305 Burnside Street - 12:10 P.M. with Mrs. Julia Johnson as president, the group adjourned to Lincoln High School, Room 217 for a joint program of the Northern Section of the Classical Association of the Pacific States and the Classical Section of the Oregon State Teachers Association.

Since Professor Frederick S. Dunn, Univ. of Oregon was unable to attend the meeting on account of serious illness, the vice-president Celia Davis, Grant High School, Portland, Oregon called the meeting to order. Miss Davis called attention to the material on display, furnished by the Classical Bureau ^{newspaper} of New York Univ., after which the program as printed and inserted followed. After the papers on the program were read, and after Mapt. Orwell C. Pratt, Spokane W^{ash}, President of the National Education Association, had led a very stimulating discussion on "The Place of the Classics in Modern Education", a short business meeting was held.
