FROM THE SECRETARY-TREASURER

- 1. The membership stands at 121. Membership forms have been sent along with the <u>Bulletin</u> to all of last year's members who have not yet paid for the current year. Journal subscriptions were sent in on October 22, December 4, and January 19, and will be sent in again in March. In case of any problem with journal Subscriptions, contact the secretary-treasurer.

THE AMERICAN PHILOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION AWARDS FOR EXCELLENCE IN THE TEACHING OF THE CLASSICS

The American Philological Association, in accordance with its commitment to honor and to foster excellence in the teaching of the Classics, will make seven awards for excellence in teaching at the college level in 1980. One award will be made for each of the following regions: Region I, New England and Eastern Canada; Region II, Atlantic States and Quebec; Region III,

Southeastern States; Region IV, Midwestern States (eastern section); Region V, Midwestern States (western section); Region VI, Pacific States and Western Canada; Region VII, Southwestern States. Selection of winners will be based on the following: (A) excellence in the teaching of Classics at the <u>undergraduate</u> level; (B) subject matter: all subjects generously included in the term 'classical,' e.g. Greek and Latin language, literature, culture, mythology, history, etymology, etc.; (C) due weight shall be given to the design and successful implementation of new courses and programs; (D) nominees must be members of the Association and have a minimum of three years teaching experience prior to nomination. Awards will be presented at the Annual Meeting of the APA in December in conjunction with the Presidential Address.

Letters of nomination should be submitted in <u>five</u> copies, with a statement indicating that the candidate has indicated his or her willingness to compete. Three letters of support, also in five copies, must be submitted as well. The nominee should submit five copies of a <u>curriculum vitae</u> and five copies of brief descriptions of all courses taught during the preceding three years. All materials must be sent by October 15, 1980 to the Committee on Awards for Excellence in the Teaching of the Classics, The American Philological Association, 617 Hamilton Hall, Columbia University, New York, New York 10027.

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Local Information

Registration: There will be a \$2.00 registration fee for all participating in the annual meeting. This may be paid at the time of registration.

Lodging: Accommodations are available without reservations in Turner Hall for about \$6 per night. Check-in possible at any hour at the front entrance. Other motels are available at standard rates between the highway and the campus, e.g., Thunderbird (406) 543-7251, Ponderosa (406) 543-3102, and the elegant Village Red Lion Motor Inn (406) 728-3100.

Arrival: Those arriving on Thursday evening flights between 6 and 7 pm can be met at the airport if they will make arrangements with Professor Madden. Those arriving on other flights will find taxi service to town or campus.

Those arriving by car on the Interstate Highway should exit at the Van Buren Street interchange in Missoula (the last, for those coming from the West). Follow, then, the large overhead highway signs for about one mile to the campus. The motels mentioned above, and several others are along this route. Arthur Avenue begins at the end of the bridge, and runs past a tall, layered brown and white dormitory. Next to this dormitory is a parking lot, and immediately behind this is the rear of Turner Hall (between Daly and University on Arthur Avenue).

Meals: Breakfasts are available at the University Center, Copper Commons, on campus (full) and at the Sandwich Shop, across Arthur Avenue behind Turner Hall (continental).

For other meals, Missoula offers a wide selection within a limited variety of restaurants. A banquet has been arranged for Friday evening at the Spaghetti Station, a popular dining place with an antique atmosphere. The menu is veal scallopini in a full course dinner, for \$9.00, including gratuity. Transportation will be available. Advance reservation and payment are required for this banquet.
