LOCAL INFORMATION

Arrival: Bus service (\$3.60) is available from the Seattle/Tacoma Airport to the Olympic Hotel in downtown Seattle and taxi service (\$5-\$6) to the University is available from there. Taxi service is of course also available from the airport (\$18-\$20). It may in fact be cheapest to take the taxi from the airport, if several persons travel together and split the fare. Ask the driver in advance what his fare is because fees are not ordinarily posted so as to be visible from outside the cab; and, as the fees vary, there have been complaints in this regard. For this reason I quote rates given above which were supplied to me by the Grey Top Dispatcher.

Those arriving by car on I-5 should take the Northeast 45th Street off-ramp and travel east to the University district.

Lodging: Members who plan to spend one or more nights in Seattle may wish to consider making a reservation at one of the following hostels, which are located within walking distance of the University of Washington campus:

- 3. The College Inn, 4000 University Way NE, Seattle WA 98105 (one block from campus). Telephone: (206) 633-4441.

European-style guest house on National Register of Historic Places, Furnished with antiques, Continental breakfast, running water in each room, shared bathrooms, no TV or phones in rooms.

Rates: Single \$20, Double (double-bed) \$27, Triple \$35.

NOTE: Rates are quoted as of February 6, 1981, and may increase by April. To all rates add 5.4% sales tax.

Parking on Campus: On-campus parking will be available both Friday evening and all-day Saturday. Fee is 75¢ each day payable upon entering the campus. Parking attendant will refer visitors to the closest available parking to the building in question (Denny Hall on Friday evening; the HUB on Saturday).

Meals: There are all sorts of food at reasonable places to eat on University Way NE within walking distance of your hotels. I especially recommend "Costas" (4559) for breakfast and lunch and "Avenue 52" (5247) for dinner.

Lunch on Saturday, April 4. A no-host lunch has been arranged for noon on Saturday, April 4, in the HUB, the same building where the meeting will take place. The menu will be homemade soup, "Hefty Sandwich" (roast beef, cheddar cheese, tomatoes, and onion rings on freshly baked bread), luncheon salad, carrot cake, choice of coffee, tea, or milk. Price of the lunch will be \$5.00, including sales tax and gratuity, and will be payable on the day of the meeting.

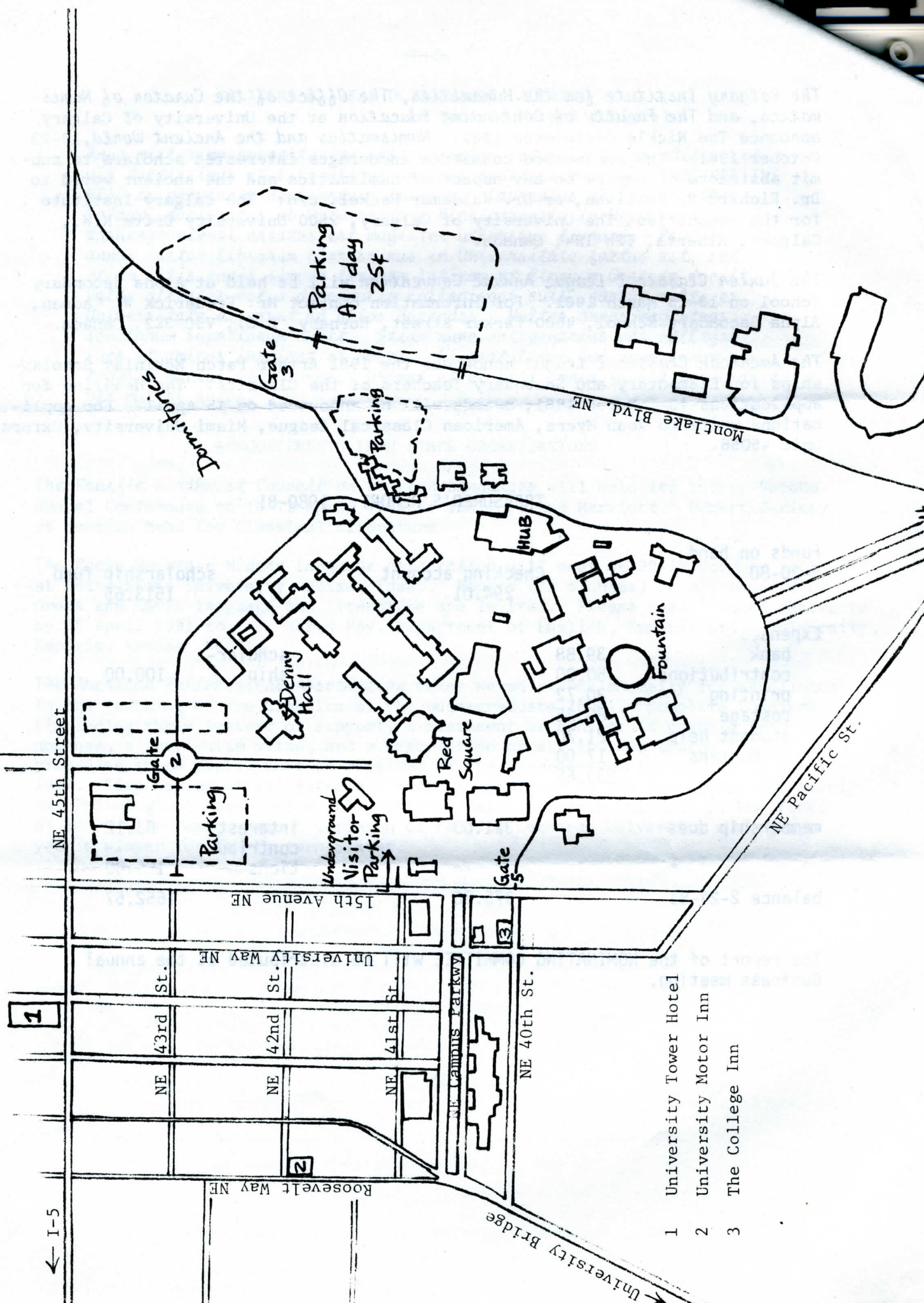
