APA TEACHING AWARDS

One to three awards will be given in 1983 to college teachers from the United States and Canada. Each winner shall receive a certificate of award and a cash prize of fifty dollars. The awards will be presented at the Annual Meeting of the Association next December in Cincinnati in conjunction with the Presidential Address.

CRITERIA

The following factors are considered in the selection process: (a) excellence in the teaching of the Classics at the undergraduate level; (b) subject matter: all subjects generously included in the term "classical," e.g., Greek and Latin language, literature, culture, mythology, history, etymology; (c) due weight is given to the design and successful implementation of new courses and programs; (d) nominees must be members of the Association and have a minimum of three years of teaching experience prior to nomination.

NOMINATION

Five copies of all materials concerning nomination must be submitted to the Committee on Awards at the address of the Secretary of the Association. While a letter of self-nomination may be necessary in an exceptional case, a letter of nomination is preferred. The nominator should arrange that at least three letters (up to a maximum of six) of support be submitted by any appropriate source, e.g., students, former students, colleagues, chairperson, dean, or higher administrative officer. At least one letter should be received from each of the following categories: students, colleagues, administrative superiors. Please be sure to advise persons who write letters that five copies must be submitted. The nominator must also arrange that the nominee's chairperson or appropriate superior submit five copies of the following: (1) curriculum vitae and (2) brief descriptions of all courses taught during the preceding three years. If the actual curriculum vitae is not available, the nominator should include as much information about the nominee's background and record as possible. Syllabi of representative courses may be submitted instead of the descriptions.

Any additional supporting documents or materials should also be submitted in five copies.

SELECTION PROCEDURES

The Secretary of the Association forwards nominations and supporting material to the chairperson of the Committee on Awards for Excellence in the Teaching of Classics. This Committee is composed of three persons who have previously received an APA Award for Excellence in the Teaching of Classics. If the Committee deems it necessary, it may request additional information after the dossiers have been reviewed.

SUBMISSION OF MATERIALS

All materials must be submitted to the Committee on Awards for Excellence in the Teaching of the Classics in care of the Secretary of the American Philological Association by 30 May 1983. Only those dossiers which are completed by the deadline and of which five copies exist can be considered in the selection process.
