MINUTES OF THE 1975 MEETING

The fifth annual meeting of the Classical Association of the Pacific Northwest (the 63rd since the organization of CAPS, which CAPN continues) was held April 5, 1975, at the University of Washington

The business meeting was called to order at the end of the morning session by the President, Professor Daniel P. Harmon.

UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON

A conference for Latin teachers was held Saturday, November 22. Speakers included Professor Daniel Harmon of the University of Washington; Professor Samuel Carleton of Pacific Lutheran University, who reported on the program developed by Dr. Judith LeBovit for use in the Washington, D.C., schools; Mr. Marvin Davis, who is teaching Latin at Tonasket High School and who received the CAPN Scholarship award for 1975; Mr. William D. Curtis, the new Latin teacher in Olympia; and Mrs. Willene Koski of Sealth High School in Seattle.

Professor Daniel Harmon participated in the summer session at the American School in Athens and then spent the remaining six weeks of the summer studying in Rome. Mrs. Eileen Niven, Assistant to Professor Edmonson, has delayed her retirement until satisfactory arrangements can be made for an orderly succession. Professor Cecelia Luschnig, who was a visiting faculty member of the Classics Department in 1973-74, has replaced Professor Brophy at the University of Idaho.

Last summer Professor Harold D. Evjen and his wife, Professor Terpsichori Tzavella-Evjen, both of the University of Colorado, were visiting faculty in the Classics Department. Professor Harold Evjen gave an outstanding seminar in Roman law and politics; Professor Tzavella-Evjen gave a course in Greek art and archaeology.

Fr. William E. Hannaford has joined the Department of Classical Languages as a lecturer. Fr. Hannaford did his undergraduate work at Gonzaga, took a master's degree in Classics at Fordham, and has just completed his theological studies in Rome and Berkeley.
