The CAPN Scholarship

The CAPN Scholarship committee will recommend to the membership on Saturday, April 8, that the following changes be made in the two awards:

(1) A grant of \$200.00 (instead of \$150.00) to a teacher who will use the grant to improve teaching competence by attending a summer session at which most of the time will be spent in Latin. (The aim is to help the teacher whose Latin needs strengthening.) Application must be made by the teacher with a summary of the situation and what is hoped to be accomplished. The application must be approved by the principal of the school. The committee will consider applications and make the award in ample time for summer school registration.

(2) A grant of \$100.00 (instead of \$50.00) to each of two schools who will use the grant to purchase supplies and equipment for the Latin department (maps, books, slides, etc.). Application must be made by the teacher and must be approved by the principal. (The schools that have very little equipment will be most likely to get the awards.)

The aim of this proposal is to strengthen the Latin program where it needs it most, and to enlist the interest and support of the principal.

MEETINGS AND ORGANIZATIONS

*The British Columbia Association of Teachers of Classics*

On November 19, 1977 a conference was held for members of the BCATC to test the degree of interest in a workshop for teachers of the new Cambridge Latin Course. One of the prime concerns was the enrichment of Roman and Greek sections of the grade VII Social Studies course. Twenty-two teachers, from the high schools and universities and the grade VII Social Studies program, met for the one day workshop. Don Hodgson, using stages 1-3 of the Cambridge Latin Course, showed how the Latin language in elementary form could be used to enrich the Roman section of the grade VII Social Studies course. Bill Barazzuol made a similar presentation emphasizing the Greek alphabet. Mr. Barazzuol also introduced the Cambridge Foundation Course, a Classical Studies program which can be used from grades V to VIII directly by intermediate students. The workshop ended with plans for another gathering in the fall.

*The Association of Ancient Historians*

Professor Frederick M. Lauritsen (Department of History, Eastern Washington State University, Cheney, WA 99004) has been appointed chairman of a committee to promote membership in the Association of Ancient Historians, publishers of the American Journal of Ancient History, the only periodical in North America devoted to the field of Ancient History. The fees are \$3.00 for full membership, \$1.00 for associate membership. Subscriptions (open to full members of A.A.H. only) are \$8.00 per annum. QUISQUILLA

To encourage active involvement on the part of the students in their study of Latin, and to discourage them from simply working out the puzzle and having done with it, last year, at the University of Idaho, a four

hundred year old pedagogical trick was revived, introduced with this excerpt from Baret's Alvearie, a Latin dictionary and phrase book dating from 1573:

About eighteene yeeres agoe, having pupils at Cambridge studious of the Latine tongue, I used them often to write Epistles and Theames together, and dailie to translate some peece of English into Latine, for the more speedie attaining of the same. And after we had a little begun, perceiving what great trouble it was to come running to me for euerie worde they missed, knowing then of no other Dictionarie to helpe us, but Sir Thomas Eliots Librarie, which was come out a little before; I appointed them certaine leaves of the same booke euerie daie to write the english before the Latine, & likewise to gather a number of fine phrases out of Cicero, Terence, Caesar, Liuius, &c. & to set them vnder severall titles, for the more readie finding them againe at their neede. Thus, within a yeere or two, they had gathered together a great volume, which (for the apt similitude betweene the good Scholers and diligent Bees in gathering their waxe and honie into their Hiue) I called then their Aluearie, both for a memoriall by whom it was made, and also by this name to incourage other to the like diligence, for that they should not see their worthie praise for the same, vnworthwhile drowned in obliuion. Not long after, diuers of our friends borrowing this our worke which we had thus contriued & wrought onelie for our owne private vse, often and many waies moued me to put it in print for the commen profet of others, and the publick propagation of the Latine tongue.
